Winter Term is a two-week session during which students can complete 1 or 2 credits. For convenience, classes are offered in a remote format and the small size of the sections allows for frequent instructor interaction.

Courses are open for enrollment to current LL.M. and J.D. students (excluding 1L students). Available seats may also be offered for enrollment to current UCONN graduate students, members of the bar and Connecticut residents age 62 and over.

Approval of the enrollment request will be made by the Office of the Registrar based on requests received by November 30, 2023 and students will be notified of the status of their request at that time. After November 30, 2023 seats, if available, will be filled on a first come-first serve basis.

Practice Ready Research LAW7935-L15

This course is designed to provide students with the research skills to be successful in their summer work and beyond. The course focuses on advanced research techniques in sources frequently used in the practice of law and will expose students to free, low-cost and for-free online legal and non-legal resources. Students will be evaluated on course assignments and class participation. This course is not open to students who have successfully completed or are currently enrolled in Advanced Legal Research.

This course is to prepare students for the bar review and bar exam process with a focus on improving the analytical and writing skills needed to do well on practice bar exam questions, including essay, multiple choice, and /or performance questions. The course will cover selected specific topics tested on the bar exam with additional emphasis on refining memorization skills and learning how to self-assess writing and understanding of concepts. This course is not a substitute for a commercial bar preparation course, but may be taken before or at same time as a commercial bar prep class.

Secured Transactions: Drafting and Analysis of Note Purchase Agreements LAW7322-L15

This course will meet on campus - Chase Hall, Room 210 (weather permitting).

Also required: Review of Three Asynchronous Video presentations.

This course provides students with experience in drafting and analyzing the Model Note Purchase Agreement common to most private institutional debt transactions. Topics include structured and cross-border private debt securities. Students will learn to analyze an agreement, connect the language in the agreement to the terms of the deal, and draft protections commonly requested by clients. Knowledge of The Uniform Commercial Code A. 9 is helpful but not necessary.

Legal Tech and the Role of the In-House Lawyer LAW7321-L15

This course addresses how the regulation of privacy and technology affects the work of in-house counsel. Topics will include data privacy, artificial intelligence, and cloud computing. Students will learn how companies are using new technologies and how in-house departments manage the compliance demands stemming from the regulation of new legal tech.

Selected Academic Regulations:

- Students may enroll in up to two credits during the Winter Term.

- Open Courses may not be added after class has begun without permission of the instructor. Permission may not be granted after the 2nd class meeting.
