

Description:

The Thomas J. Meskill Law Library has an abundance of study spaces, is home to several classrooms, administrative offices and our cafe.

Tour notes:

The Library houses the Career Development Center, One-Stop (Student Finance, Business, Registrar & Student Services offices), Admissions Office, and the student cafe making it a real pulse point for campus life. On the exterior wall of the library, just above the cafe, you can see engraved stones that depict a criminal trial taken from start to finish.

Description:

Knight Hall houses classrooms and seminar rooms, a student lounge, and our fitness center.

The student lounge has vending machines that are excellent for study snacks. All the student journals are in this building; you will be able to try out to become an editor for a journal after your first year.



Description:

William F. Starr Hall contains the Main Reading Room, site of the law school's largest events, several classrooms, and offices for a variety of student and faculty organizations.

Tour notes:


Both of our courtrooms are housed in Starr, a trial courtroom and an Appellate court room. The Starr reading room is our main event space on campus and events are largely coordinated by our 40+ student organizations. Our mental health counselor has office space in this building as well. Students are required to meet with a mental health counselor at least once during their first year.

Description:

Cheryl A. Chase Hall houses the Dean's Office, several other administrative offices and the two largest lecture rooms on campus.

Many 1L classes are held in these classrooms.



Description:

Hosmer Hall is the site of faculty offices and Janet M. Blumberg Hall, where many law school events are held.
